Develop activities in creative writing for ages 4-11, such as handstitched, illustrated books made to include individual writing; exercises that show form and technique; oral reading of poetry, with feedback on written and oral work.

Develop and present activities in writing poetry to ages 6-9 with an emphasis on work written and orally presented during class time.

<u>Teacher</u>, Burgundy Farm Country Day School, Alexandria, VA, Fall, 1983 - Spring, 1987.

Teach fourth and fifth graders math, science, history, language arts, including creative writing units. Plan special natural science unit at Cooper's Cove. Teach kindergarten (three years).

Develop creative writing programs for children and young adults. Work with an assistant to lead students in making hand-stitched books, with daily exercises in writing, and workshops in book-making. Every class receives examples of poetry by writers, past and present, with an examination and discussion of technique and style. Written evaluation and critical comments offered; discussions held with each student.

Develop units in writing poetry with topics such as writing poetry with journals entries as poetry sources, including lectures on lives of well-known artists such as Franz Kafka, Ann Truitt, Katherine Mansfield, George Sand and Paul Gauguin. Provide students with syllabus, life chronologies of artists, and a bibliography. Other unit topics: examining published and workshop poetry with regard to male and female approaches; and writing poems in response to an international sampling of poets in translation. Give oral and written critical feedback on writing assignments.

Lecture on literary journals; teach journal-keeping in connection with professional and creative development. Prepare materials on journals of writers and artists. Give feedback on journal development of each participant.

Introduce poetry to ages 5-7 year olds, with oral and writing activities.
